

A Message From The Minister

Dear Friends,

It's amazing, and disconcerting, how quickly things can go wrong. In Nehemiah 12, the former exiles, now back in their home land, we're singing and dancing in celebration of the newly dedicated city of Jerusalem. Now, in chapter 13, we read of spectacular case of 'when the cat's away, the mice will play'. Nehemiah has returned to Babylon, and to his old job in service of King Artaxerxes. Returning to Jerusalem to see how they are getting on, he is shocked at what he finds. An awful lot of backsliding had gone on, and it seems they had forgotten their special calling to be God's distinctive, holy people. One outrage which particularly incenses Nehemiah is the giving of a room in the Temple to Tobiah who, you might remember, had been a fierce opponent of the Israelites and the rebuilding of Jerusalem's walls. We might wonder what the big fuss was all about - surely it's only a room? Where's the harm? Well, the harm resides in the fact that the High Priest is bringing that which is profane into a holy space. We might see our buildings in a purely functional way, so it can be hard for us to understand that the Temple represented the presence of God. It contained the Holy of holies, a space so sacred only the High Priest could enter, and then only after ceremonial cleansing. We don't need a building to symbolise God's presence, as we have Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh, who brings us, through faith, into the very presence of God. He is our High Priest. For the ancient Israelites however, being in the Temple was the nearest thing they had to standing before God, and so to desecrate it was a terrible thing.

What can we learn from this? Well, what stands out loud and clear is that it is dangerous to compromise our faith. Such a compromise is exactly what Eliashib the High Priest did in allowing Tobiah to take over part of the Temple. Are there any ways in which we allow our faith to be compromised? Do we listen to the world when it tells us that the Bible is ridiculous, that our faith is offensive, that Jesus Christ was just a great moral teacher and nothing more. Sometimes we view our faith through the lens of our secular society instead of looking at the world with the eyes of faith. We contradict scripture, water down truths God has revealed to us (the virgin birth or the resurrection for example) and we sit in judgement of God as if we know better. Many theologians and biblical scholars have taken this approach and led us to believe that this is the nature, intelligent approach to take and makes us more relevant to the wider world. The result? Decline. The spiritual life and vitality of the church goes down the drain. Compromising on revealed truths is every bit as bad as the Israelites desecrating the Temple and flouting the sabbath. Far better to take God at His word, and take the riskier, but richer, more fruitful, more truthful path, and allowing ourselves to be transformed and renewed by God's word instead of trying to fit those words into a mould more acceptable to secular society. Let's do it. Let's take the risk.

Let's care less about what people think of us and more about honouring the God who gave Himself for us and calls us to give ourselves wholly to Him.

Church Green Team - Clothes That Cost The Earth

I really enjoy Simon Reeve's travel programmes and during his latest South America series I was horrified to see a huge landfill site in the Atacama Desert in Chile filled with hundreds of thousands of tonnes of clothes from other countries. I was also surprised to hear that the greenhouse gas emissions from textile production is more than those of all international flights and maritime shipping combined.

Though I am not a follower of fast fashion (new styles released frequently often at cheap prices and low quality) I decided I needed to do something about my own clothes 'consumption',

Checking through our wardrobes

I found clothes that I wasn't going to wear again which I passed on to my daughter or to charity shops and a couple of old t-shirts which I cut up for cleaning cloths. There were some items I didn't wear because they had loose buttons or small stains which I have now sorted and others that I was saving for best that are now regular.

Extending the life of the clothes that we have

The main way to extend the life of the clothes we have is to wash them less, Research by washing machine company AEG showed that 90% of items that are washed are not dirty enough to need it. Washing leads to 'wear' on fabric, colours fading and to clothes shrinking and becoming mis-shapen

reducing the 'life' of clothes. Washing clothes less often and at lower temperatures will use less electric and also reduce water usage which is important for those on water meters as well as for the planet.

I don't like to wear the same top for two days running at work but instead of washing it after one wear I put it on a hanger to wear again at the weekend and the following week.

Repairing clothes can also extend their 'life' and we are hoping to have a Repair Café at 'Wonford Welcome' soon!

Adding 'responsibly' to our wardrobes

The production of petroleum based fibres like polyester creates greenhouse gases but there are now bio based synthetic fibres made from renewable crops like sugar cane which are more environmentally friendly and also recycled polyester.

Organic cotton has less environmental impact than cotton as it doesn't use fertiliser or pesticides and often goes hand-in hand with more natural dyes. Instead of buying new think about buying second-hand clothes - now rebranded as pre-loved or vintage! - online (local if possible) or from a charity shop. I am really pleased with an organic cotton Sea Salt shirt which was 'as new' from the Sue Ryder shop in Heavitree for only £5!

If you want clothes for a special occasion Oxfam have an online shop for second hand designer items or think about renting or buying an outfit.

Gift Aid

As most of you will realise the cost of living has gone up considerably in the past few months. This has and will be affecting the costs of running the church. With this in mind it is important that we make the most of offerings made. One fairly easy way of doing this is by Gift Aiding any donations you make if you pay Income Tax. Currently, this means that for every £1.00 you donate to the church, we can claim 25p from the government. That makes your donation £1.25. Many people already do this and we are extremely grateful for their Gift Aiding. If you do not already Gift Aid but would like to do so, please speak to me and I can give more information and explain what you need to do.

If you do not pay Income Tax, we can still claim 25p in each £1.00, under what is called GADS, but this has certain rules. If you would like more information about GADS, please speak to me.
