

A Message From The Minister

Dear Friends,

Paul told the church at Corinth that they were 'Co-workers in God's service'. That's a pretty huge claim. We think of God, quite rightly, as being all knowing and all-capable, and hardly in need of our assistance with anything. That may be true, but when someone becomes a Christian, they discover another truth: that they have been given the massive privilege of being given a part to play in God's kingdom-building work, and that they have gifts and graces which enable them to do this. In other words, God chooses to allow us to be co-workers with Him. Why, you may be thinking, am I talking about Corinthians when I'm meant to be talking about Nehemiah 7? Well, because it helps us to understand what's going on. God is at work, and so is Nehemiah in the rebuilding of the walls of Jerusalem. There is no clear division of labour between Nehemiah and God. The rebuilding of the wall is presented in Nehemiah as being the work of God, but human beings do the bricklaying. This is because, at the most basic level, God gives the gifts and abilities needed to undertake the work. Moreover, God gives the initiative and the vision to enable those abilities to be coordinated and productive. For another example, look at how it all starts. The King of Persia commissions Nehemiah to rebuild and restore Jerusalem, but it is God, moving behind the scenes who makes this happen. Nehemiah has a close relationship with God and this relationship means he acts out of he inspiration and the wisdom which he receives from God. He acts at God's prompting, which because truly knows God, he is able to recognise as such.

Does this mean that everything which happens is directly caused by God? No. He has given us free will, and allows us to use it. At the same time, God is not absent from human affairs, and is very much active in the world, in a way which doesn't override our free will. What delights God the most however, is when we, of our own free will, choose to entwine our lives with God's purposes and give ourselves to His service, as Nehemiah does.

What's also happening in this chapter is the beginning of the rebuilding of human community in Jerusalem, as well as the walls. Hence the very long list of names! This list of names, by the way, may seem to us to be ridiculously obsessed with who everyone's ancestors were, thus determining whether they had a right to reside in the rebuilt Jerusalem. In our age of 'inclusiveness', this may seem unfair or cruel. Nehemiah is doing

it however, for the sake of the survival of God's people. We have already seen how these people have enemies circling all around. This must be a true community of God's people, and those who simply want to dominate those people, regardless of what God might want, are guarded against. This list of names may not make for exciting reading, but they show the care and attention with which Nehemiah is approaching his task, and his determination that idolatry and pagan practices be kept out. All in all, this is the wonderful story of God and His people, reconstructing and restoring what heedless humanity had seemingly destroyed forever.

Green Team Article - How to Go Green?

For anyone thinking about embarking on a greener lifestyle or looking at ways to further their green credentials.

It can be a difficult if not bewildering exercise. If you search "going green" you are immediately presented with a scope of information that does little to guide you. You can find ways to go green in 5 steps and you can find lists that turn you green in 100 steps. You can also find 40 ways to go green at home, or 10 simple changes to live green at work; and there are actually 84 earth friendly ideas. Interestingly, there are specific ways for teenagers to go green – these seem to revolve around the use of showers and turning lights off.

Searching for more guidance I turned to the **United Nations Sustainable Development Goals**

Here I found 17 global goals and 169 global targets.

Whilst each of these goals **is** profoundly important, such as ending hunger and ensuring sustainable clean water and sanitation, it is challenging for an individual to be inspired by a publication which the Lancet described as being 'fairy tales, dressed up'.

So how do you go Green?

The Christian doctrine of creation is the starting point for theological reflection on the issue of climate change. The church has always celebrated the beauty of creation in praise and thanksgiving as a sign of God's gracious goodness.

Entering into prayer and reflection about the issues around us should be an integral part of our worship and is our essential start point for going Green.

Let us all join in prayer and share our faith in worship for our world created and sustained by a loving God.

Beyond Self Christian Retreats

My name is Abigail and I'm a local preacher and member at the Mint. I wanted to share my new project with you. I was inspired to start Beyond Self a few years ago when, as part of my growing self-awareness that comes with training as a counsellor (www.abigailhardiman-counselling.co.uk), I came to the realisation that whilst I 'do' a lot of things for God and the Church I often don't



allow enough time to simply 'be' with God. Even my prayer life can often be centred around what I am doing, rather than purely connecting with God.

I also recognised that whilst we are called by Jesus to love God with all our heart, mind and soul (or in the Old Testament with our heart, soul, strength and mind), there were significant parts of who I am that didn't feel as connected to my faith. With this new understanding I began to explore how I could experience and express my relationship with God differently, more holistically. This included exploring ancient ideas from Celtic Christianity, modern takes on mindfulness that blend traditions from the East and the West as well as concepts from transpersonal psychotherapy as part of my own training as a counsellor and psychotherapist. All of these different traditions emphasise our connections, with ourselves, with others, with creation and with God, hence the name 'Beyond Self'.

Embracing these connections has given me a sense of peace, power, hope and wholeness, even in the midst of a world that feels very broken. I wanted to share that with you by creating retreats that allow us to bring all of ourselves, just as we are and whatever we might be needing or struggling with. The advert for my July retreat is overleaf. Whether you're simply in need of a rest, or struggling with a difficult decision or life event, this wholeness and wellbeing day retreat offers a chance to replenish your resources and connect with ourselves and with God, mind, body and soul. There will be quiet moments of guided meditation, time for creative artistic expression (no artistic talent required!) and shared fellowship as we spend time together.

Queen's Speech fails to address cost of living challenge facing millions

A response to the Queen's Speech from Paul Morrison, Policy Adviser for the Methodist Church

The Queen's Speech has failed to offer help to families being pulled under by the cost-of-living crisis. Churches and charities have been reporting that more and more families having trouble making ends meet. This week alone, we learned from the Food Foundation that 7.3 million adults are unable to afford the food they need, and that an additional 250,000 are expected to be pushed into destitution in the coming months.

Something is going profoundly wrong when a wealthy society tolerates millions going hungry and destitute. Families are working when they can unemployment has returned to record lows. Charity is doing its bit – Trussell Trust foodbanks supplied over 2 million food parcels last year. Government must play its part and not shirk its responsibilities.

The Queen's speech sets out the Government's priorities over the next Parliamentary session. It is an opportunity to indicate how the government aim to tackle the issues that families are facing today. Unfortunately, that opportunity has not been taken.

This was also an opportunity for government to set out an agenda for key policy areas such as benefits, housing and employment to ensure that families are not left so exposed to cold economic winds in future. While there was no clear strategy to address the current crisis short or long term there was legislation proposed around renting, levelling-up and energy

markets which could be used to begin to move us in the right direction. As yet however the details are not clear.

Churches all over the country run foodbanks and we long for the day when they close through lack of demand. Families, charities and communities are already acting to bring that day closer, but it also requires ambition and action from government of which this Queen's speech showed little sign.

A Methodist Way of Life

The calling of the Methodist Church is to respond to the gospel of God's love in Christ and to live out its discipleship in worship and mission.

God loves you unconditionally, no strings attached. That's the good news.

In response to this gift, there are twelve things that we do individually and together as we grow as followers of Jesus, which help us to worship God, serve others, be evangelistic, and learn and care together. None of this makes God love you any more - but they may help you realise how deeply you are loved by God. As far as we are able, with God's help, we:
