

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A Message From The Minister


Dear Friends,

This month marks a special saint's day, and I'm not talking about the over-rated Patrick. March 20th is the feast day of St. Cuthbert. I know we Methodists don't do saints in a big way, and there's a good reason for that. A saint, biblically, is anyone who has given their life to Christ. Nonetheless, I like Cuthbert. I lived in Durham for two years, and walked past his awe-inspiring tomb most days. Cuthbert became famous in his own lifetime for his holiness, learning, love of creation and his inspirational preaching. He had a passion for mission, but valued contemplation and reflection too. His eventual final resting place, amid the Norman splendour of Durham Cathedral, is fitting, I feel. I'm grateful to all such as Cuthbert who have carried out the Great Commission in their own day so that the Church can be here today.

There are social and cultural pressures on us at the moment pushing us to see the past entirely in negative terms – as an endless catalogue of oppression and injustice and wrong thinking. As well as being ludicrously simplistic, this approach ignores the many bright lights which illuminate the history of our species, the many examples of faith and godliness, the countless examples of God's grace being made manifest in human lives, down the ages. We are not living in a uniquely enlightened age - far from it. We have our glories, and our follies, as any other era does.

To assume that goodness and truth exist only in our own time and that we can therefore expunge everything and start again is supremely misguided. Every age builds on the advances of previous ones, but still manages to make plenty of mistakes of its own. History gives us valuable perspective and the great figures of our Christian heritage give us something else as well – inspiration. We need our Cuthberts, as it were, if we are going to be in our age and generation what they were in theirs. Let's be grateful for all who have gone before us, whether the example they have left is one to learn from or to emulate.

Persecution and the Early Church: a series of three Zoom Sessions

Thursdays March 4th, 11th, 18th: 7 pm to 8 pm

March 4th: "The destroyers of our Gods": pagan motives and their consequences

The Romans were not in general intolerant of strange religions, so why did they persecute the Christians ? What did the Christians do to deserve it ? Or was it what they did not do?

Reading: Pliny the Younger Letters X, 96-7. Emperor Maximinus Daza: Rescript to the City of Tyre of 312 AD (in Eusebius HE IX, 7, 2-15 = 283-85)

March 11th: Fear, apostasy, flight and defiance: the range of Christian reaction

Our idea of the persecutions is dominated by the passions of individual martyrs, but many of these are fiction. Even the authentic passions record only the last stages of the martyr's trial and execution; it is as if all we had of Hamlet was the pile of bodies at the end of the final Act. A more rounded picture of Christian experience under persecution, especially of the fear that it engendered, can be gleaned from reading a wider range of sources.

Reading: Letters of Dionysius Patriarch of Alexandria (HE VI, 40-42 = 205-10)

Peter, Patriarch of Alexandria Canons of Easter 306

March 18th: "Being made perfect": the spirituality of the martyrs

Reading: Extracts from Origen Exhortation to Martyrdom

How We Can Make a Difference - 'Green' Days throughout March

22nd February to 7th March - Fairtrade fortnight.

The COVID-19 pandemic has shown us more than ever how interconnected we are globally. This is at the very heart of the Fairtrade message and is where our role begins. By supporting Fairtrade, we have the power to drive long-term change, not only with our shopping choices but with our support in spreading the message and through prayer. Thank the Lord for the work of organisations like Fairtrade and Traidcraft, and lift our prayers of support for the farmers & workers who grow our food and the issues they face.

3rd March – World Wildlife Day.

The theme for this year is 'Forests and Livelihoods: Sustaining People and Planet'. This looks to shed light on the links between the state of our planet's forests & woodlands and the preservation of the many livelihoods that depend on them, with much attention to the traditional knowledge of the communities who have managed forest ecosystems & its wildlife for centuries!

This aligns with the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, including Goal 1 (No Poverty), Goal 2 (Zero hunger), Goal 12 (Ensure sustainable consumption and production patterns), Goal 13 (Climate Action) and Goal 15 (Life on Land). We are being encouraged to just #DoOneThingToday to make a difference and help wildlife conservation.

Set a Goal – Live your daily life with the smallest negative impact on the environment, wildlife, their habitats, or the planet's biodiversity, discuss wildlife conservation and what you and your community can do to help.

Consume Responsibly – we could find out how and what we consume could affect the lives & environment of wildlife. And ask ourselves is it ethically sourced, promoting sustainable living and good animal welfare?

Stay informed – learn more about the planet's flora and fauna, including those that are in danger of extinction.

Volunteer – we cannot always give money, but we can pray and donate our time. Often wildlife and conservation organisations like the Devon Wildlife Trust & Ludwell Life have volunteer events and even safely picking up & disposing of litter can protect wildlife from harm.

18th March – Global Recycling Day.

Every year the Earth yields billions of natural resources and at some point, in the not too distant future, it will run out. Think again about what we throw away – seeing not waste but opportunity. Recycling is a key part of the circular economy, helping us to protect our natural resources. Give thanks to our Creator God for the wonderful world He has given us and pray that we as stewards cultivate, guard and use it wisely.

22nd March – World Water Day.

How important is water to your home and daily life, your wellbeing, your local environment? Think about the different ways water benefits our lives, how we can value water properly and safeguard it effectively for everyone. Thank the Lord for all we have and pray for those who cannot turn on a tap or get fresh water.


