A Message From The Minister


Dear Friends,

Psalm 51

We sometimes teach children to pray with a teaspoon. TSP of course, standing for 'thank you, sorry and please'. This is a good way into prayer, but I wonder if our understanding of the 'sorry' but never really develops much from our childhood understanding. What I mean is, we say 'sorry' to God when we've done something particularly regrettable, but otherwise we assume we're fine. On the other hand, there are those who live with a constant, and crippling, sense of their own wretchedness, plagued with a feeling of being worthless. Psalm 51 delivers a crucial message for both.

The context is this: David, the author, has committed adultery with Bathsheba and arranged for her husband to be killed in battle so as hide the fact that Bathsheba is pregnant and the child is his. Quite the faux pas by anyone's reckoning! The psalm is David's outpouring of regret, repentance, and anguish, but also trust that God is merciful, gracious and able to 'wash him whiter than snow'. Even after such a transgression, which David in no way diminishes or attempts to excuse, still asked for mercy, fully expecting, it seems, to receive it. Nothing and nobody, clearly, is beyond the scope of God's redemptive love. It's also worth noting that David identifies the root cause of his wrongdoing, namely, in heart which had drifted from God. He asks, not just for forgiveness, but a new spirit, a new heart, the cleansing, healing, regenerative power which only God' Spirit can bring. A great sin thus becomes a springboard for a better, healthier, holier life. Because God is who He is, this is how it often works when we really and truly seek Him, whatever we've done and whatever we think of ourselves. If we want it, and seek it, and are prepared to be changed by it, there is grace and mercy unbounded, there for the taking, from our ever loving, ever gracious God.

How We Can Make a Difference - 'Green' days throughout March

4th–17th March - Fairtrade fortnight. We are increasingly more how interconnected we are globally. This is at the very heart of the Fairtrade message and is where their role begins. It's a special festival where companies, individuals, groups, and welfare organisations come together to recognise and celebrate the farmers and workers in developing countries. Did you know that most of these people who work hard to produce the food that comes to our tables are often underpaid and exploited? This Fairtrade Fortnight is an event that highlights their issues and problems.

By supporting Fairtrade, we have the power to drive long-term change, not only with our shopping choices but with our support in spreading the message and through prayer. Thank the Lord for the work of organisations like Fairtrade and Traidcraft, and lift our prayers of support for the farmers & workers who grow our food and the issues they face.

3rd March – World Wildlife Day. The theme for this year is 'Connecting People & Planet: Exploring Digital Innovation in Wildlife Conservation'. We are in the midst of a global digital revolution that is breaking down barriers to people-centred digital governance and to equal opportunities for all to unleash the power of digital transformation. The 'digital divide' is slowly narrowing, with better connectivity and Internet access reaching 66 per cent of our global population. However, around 2.7 billion people of our global population are still not online. On average, only 36 per cent of the populations in the least developed countries and landlocked developing countries are online. Women and young people are more likely to experience gaps in Internet access and/or job-ready digital skills Technological innovation has made research, communication, tracking, DNA analysis and many other aspects of wildlife conservation easier, more efficient and accurate. Yet, uneven access to these new tools,

environmental pollution and unsustainable applications of certain technologies remain critical issues for achieving universal digital inclusion by 2030. World Wildlife Day 2024 is a platform for intergenerational exchange and youth empowerment through art, presentations and conversations on the opportunities ahead for our shared sustainable future in digital wildlife conservation. WWD2024 offers a jumping off point for exploring what digital innovations are available now, what intersectional discrepancies we are facing and how we want our digital connectivity to evolve for all people and planet.

What can we do to help protect wildlife? Live your daily life with the smallest negative impact on the environment, wildlife, their habitats, or the planet's biodiversity, discuss wildlife conservation and what you and your community can do to help. Consume Responsibly – we could find out how and what we consume could affect the lives & environment of wildlife. And ask ourselves is it ethically sourced, promoting sustainable living and good animal welfare? Stay informed – learn more about the planet's flora and fauna, including those that are in danger of extinction.

Volunteer – we cannot always give money, but we can pray and donate our time. Often wildlife and conservation organisations like the Devon Wildlife Trust & Ludwell Life have volunteer events and even safely picking up & disposing of litter can protect wildlife from harm.

18th March – Global Recycling Day. Every year the Earth yields billions of natural resources and at some point, in the not too distant future, it will run out. Think again about what we throw away – seeing not waste but opportunity. Recycling is a key part of the circular economy, helping us to protect our natural resources. Give thanks to our Creator God for the wonderful world He has given us and pray that we as stewards cultivate, guard and use it wisely.

22nd March – World Water Day. This year's theme will be 'Leveraging Water for Peace', which raises awareness and inspires us to tackle the water and sanitation crisis around the world – 2.2 billion people are living without access to safe water. How important is water to your home and daily life, your wellbeing, your local environment? Think about the different ways water benefits our lives, how we can value water properly and safeguard it effectively for everyone. Thank the Lord for all we have and pray for those who cannot turn on a tap or access fresh water.

Book Swap for World Book Day

Back in 1923 'Book Day' was a Catalonian tradition of giving books away to friends and family in honour of the birthday of Spanish author Miguel de Cervantes (most famous for his book Don Quixote).

In 1995 UNESCO created 'World Book & Copyright Day' which was aimed at promoting reading, publishing and copyright. Since then World Book Day has grown with over 100 countries now taking part and with celebrations that encompass everything from reading and writing, to fancy dress and drama events.

The 23rd of April was selected for World Book Day as it was the anniversary of the deaths of William Shakespeare and Miguel De Cervantes and several other prominent authors were born on or died on this day

The United Kingdom's own version of World Book Day began in 1998 and a charity called World Book Day gave several million schoolchildren in the UK a special £1 World Book Day Book Token which could be redeemed against any book in any UK bookshop. To avoid a clash with St Georges Day World Book Day UK is held on the first Thursday in March.

To mark World Book Day UK we are having a Book Swap on Saturday 2nd March from 10.30am to 12pm. Please bring along books for adults, teens or children and swap them for others. There will also be book related quizzes and questions, a story corner for children and free refreshments

We are also hoping to set up a Book Nook in the Church Hall for those attending Toddler Group, Wonford Welcome and Sunday Services. The charity Exeter City of Literature are donating twenty new books and a bookshelf to start us off. We would like to remind our drivers to be mindful of this space to allow all who want to and need to park on church grounds to be able to.


If there appears to be no more parking available or you are able to walk, there are spaces on the opposite side of the Lidl car park (close to the fields) that we can use.

The Leadership Team's main concern is that on days that the car park is very full emergency vehicles may not be able to access the site safely. Please make sure that you are not parked in the fire assembly area (marked

on the fence near the pedestrian front gate) opposite the church front door facing Lidl or covering any exit doors - see plan below.

Lent In The Spotlight

In the course of my work as a prison chaplain, I went one morning to visit an inmate who had just arrived in Liverpool Jail. He had committed several serious drug offences. I entered his cell, explained who I was, and shook hands with him. His very first words were, "My uncle is a Methodist lay preacher!" He quickly wanted to get out of the spotlight of selling vast amounts of dangerous drugs, by shifting the spotlight to his worthy uncle! "An Inspector Calls" is a powerful film often shown on TV; many of you will have seen it. A very respectable, upper-class family are interrupted in their evening meal by a police inspector, who informs them that a young woman, Eva Smith, has just taken her own life. The whole Birling family deny having any knowledge of or involvement with this Eva, and express annoyance at this inspector's sudden, uncalled-for intrusion into their family celebrations.

However, the inspector's persistent investigation reveals that ALL the Birling family, father, mother, daughter, son, plus the daughter's fiancé DID know and meet Eva, and each one clearly played some part in Eva's death. The daughter admits "We're up to our necks in it, aren't we?" One by one, the

inspector puts each of their lives firmly in the guilt spotlight.

Years ago on holiday in Spain, I saw El Greco's famous painting of the crucifixion in Toledo Cathedral. He was accused of making a huge error by painting the soldiers in Spanish uniform, not Roman! But El Greco insisted he was right to put Spanish soldiers in the spotlight at Calvary.

Certainly Peter, Jesus' right-hand man, didn't want to be in the spotlight when he was asked if he knew this arrested prisoner Jesus. 'Peter got really nervous and swore, "I never laid eyes on this man you're talking about." (Mark 14 v 71) Make no mistake, we are all implicated in Christ's death! Would I, would you, have shouted "Crucify him!" when Pilate asked the crowd what they wanted him to do with Jesus?

The season of Lent reminds us that we are ALL in the spotlight! Our challenge is to use these weeks leading up to Easter to make time each day to pray, to deepen our commitment to our Lord, and ask for His increased power in our lives. Let's make space to put ourselves in the spotlight at Calvary.

"Guilty, vile and helpless we, Spotless Lamb of God was He, Full atonement can it be? Hallelujah! What a Saviour!"

A 'holy inspector' has unexpectedly called to ask us, "Were YOU there when they crucified my Lord?"


