A Message From The Minister

Dear Friends,

And so we come to the final of the rhythms of discipleship – Read & Reflect. This might best be understood as an interpretation of the fact that the early church “devoted themselves to the apostles’ teaching and fellowship” (Acts 2:42). Whilst the early church may have been able to listen directly to Peter, John, and others, and to devote themselves to this, we do not have this privilege. What we do have, however, is their teaching recorded in scripture. When we take the time to read scripture, and to give ourselves to this wholeheartedly, in terms of time, energy and attention (for to reflect is to think deeply and care-fully about something), then we too follow in the footsteps of the early church devoting themselves to the apostles’ teaching. What I find interesting is that Luke pairs this with fellowship. It seems to me that Luke is suggesting these two things went together, perhaps even needed each other. The teaching of the apostles’ was received collectively. Their devotion to it was shared as they encouraged one another on, as they wrestled with what it meant. It’s an emphasis we find consistently within Methodism; that our understanding of scripture, our reading and reflecting, is best done together (and all members are encouraged to be part of a group for this reason).

For some of us, the challenge of this particular rhythm will be in making the time to read, or to find the energy and care with which to think deeply (and prayerfully) on what we have read. For others, perhaps the challenge might be more about how do we do this together? There is absolutely a place for personal Bible reading, but how might we grow more by reading with others, reflecting together, and being both challenged and encouraged by the insights of those also seeking to follow Jesus? [For those who are not already part of one of our Bible Studies or House groups, there is an ideal opportunity to explore this practice with the 4 week Jonah Bible Study I will be running in June/July – see details elsewhere in Contact]

Minister's Monthly Bible Study Group


This group meets in the lounge at 2pm normally on the third Thursday each month. All are welcome. This month they are continuing to study Job.

It's an opportunity to plunge into the depths of the Bible, to immerse yourself in Scripture by focusing on a single Biblical book to help us read the whole Bible better and more deeply.

Why Jonah? Jonah invites us to consider how God calls us to mission in the unlikeliest of places. It points to a God who is compassionate and loving to all, and challenges us to reflect this God in our mission.

At Wonford, we will be engaging in Bible Month in two ways. Firstly our preaching at Sunday morning services will focus on a different chapter from Jonah throughout June/early July:

17th June – Jonah 2: Rev'd Alan Rothwell

8th July – Jonah 4: Rev'd Bruce Sawyer

Secondly, Bruce will be running a 4 week study group. This will meet in the lounge on Thursday evenings at 7.30pm (for about an hour). Each week will feature a DVD reflection from Jeff Lucas to get us thinking about the story of Jonah, followed by discussion.

What's the Value of a Piece of Paper? – our Wonderful Local Preachers

The Fundamental Question for Methodism

In my opening letter I encouraged us to read and reflect on scripture together, and said that this brings both encouragement and challenge. Reading and reflecting together is not always easy, and we will not always agree. I therefore want to commend to you the following article. The article was written by Rev'd Sam McBratney. Sam was my dissertation supervisor at Queens' and has worked closely with Rev'd Paul Smith in helping the Methodist Church reflect on issues of sexuality. Please note, I am not asking you to agree with Sam's convictions regarding marriage but to reflect on his question of whether we can live in a church with those with whom we disagree, and whether his final suggestion of assumptions to make regarding those with whom we disagree is helpful.

Of course I am very willing to engage in discussion and reflection on this article with anyone who would appreciate that!

The Fundamental Question for Methodism

The Churches have been struggling with the inclusion of open LGBTQ+ Christians for fifty years and more and many are still struggling. Since the introduction of legal same-sex marriage in many jurisdictions about the world, the churches in those places especially have been forced to address the question of whether they would bless or solemnise such unions. For the most part, with some notable exceptions, churches have either said an outright 'no' or 'can we think about it?'

For my own tradition, two of its branches are currently in the throes of debate about the next steps forward. The United Methodist Church, based in the US but covering 54 countries, is about to release its report on the

Way Forward and take it to a vote next year. In the British Conference, a debate is scheduled for this July on the definition of marriage. I have been involved in numerous conversations about this over the last few months and get both frustrated and concerned that the question is framed around a zero-sum choice of yes/no to same-sex marriage with a consequential schism in the church, one way or the other. As in the past, when issues such as women's ordination or attitudes to race or war have been debated, this framing is intended to polarise opinion and create battle cries, not Christian conferring.

The fundamental question is not whether people are in favour of same-sex marriage. Recent consultations have clearly shown that a significant proportion of British Methodists are indeed in favour, with many others undecided. The question therefore really is: can you live in the same church with people who fundamentally disagree with you? A vote on the floor of Conference may affect our practice to a certain extent, but it will not change the reality of a Church whose members hold contradictory convictions. We have placed such emphasis on the vote itself that we fail to take seriously how we live the day after it.

This is not to say I will give up campaigning for recognition of same-sex marriage in British Methodism - far from it! But I would be happy to live with an 'official' position that says that Methodists disagree about these things. With pacifism and alcohol and abortion rights and remarriage after divorce and cohabitation, Methodists hold positions that are Biblically-based, theologically-reasoned and pastorally-informed, but often contradictory. Yet someone whose grandfather was imprisoned for conscientious objection and someone whose father flew bombing raids over Dresden sit next to one another every Sunday in chapels across the Connexion.

Twelve years ago, when it became clear that opinions on relationships were not going to converge, Methodism began talking about 'contradictory convictions'. To live well together with those with whom we disagree, we need ground-rules. Here are six assumptions to make about the other person that might help to form them:

that they have read their Bible, prayed and thought through their position;
that they have heard most or all of the arguments and don't need to be 'enlightened';

- that they are trying to live as faithful and authentic a Christian life as you;
- that their views and convictions shape them but do not completely define who they are - people are much more than the views they hold;
- that they are open to listening and discussion with good grace and Christian love and will give you the same respect and courtesy as you give them;

- that they want to be part of a Church that is faithful to the gospel and shares the love of Christ with all.

Joyfest

Between Monday 4th – Sunday 10th June Wonford Methodist Church will be joining with other churches across Exeter for a celebration of smiles and brightened days.

The strategy comes from Jesus. He said, *“Let your good deeds shine out for all to see, so that everyone will praise your heavenly Father.”* (Matthew 5:16)

Joyfest is a week of intentional good deeds for friends, family and strangers. It's a chance to focus our efforts, take a step out of our comfort zone and do something simple to brighten someone else's day. These are the 'good deeds' Jesus asks us to do.

But we want the praise to go to God, not to us, so the Joyfest initiative helps people join-the-dots; seeing that our good deed isn't because we're nice, but because we follow God, who is full of generosity, kindness and joy.

Each time you do an act of joy or have a conversation you can give someone a Joyfest card, with the website address for more information. It will take a bit of bravery, but everyone can do something to make someone smile. It doesn't have to be a terrifying leap into the unknown; even a small step out of our comfort zone is a powerful declaration of faith!

Maybe you could imagine yourself saying something like, *“Hi, I'm taking part in Joyfest, it's like a social experiment to brighten the day of people in Exeter, so I wondered if I could pay for your coffee? Here's a card with some info, if you're interested.”*

Why not also make an effort to encourage family/friends/neighbours to come to church on this Sunday (regardless of whether you were able to do an act of kindness for them).

The Royal Wedding Preacher Who Stole The Show



While Curry's sermon received wide praise, a few naysayers complained it went on for too long. I would beg to differ, but if you're of that ilk, or if you missed it entirely, below is an edited version. The key passages have been highlighted. It's a great speech, made all the more remarkable by the fact it was witnessed by hundreds of millions (perhaps billions) worldwide.

The late Dr. Martin Luther King once said, and I quote, **we must discover the power of love, the redemptive power of love.** And when we do that we will make of this old world a new world.

There's power in love. Don't underestimate it. Don't even over-sentimentalise it. There's power, power in love.

If you don't believe me, think about a time when you first fell in love. The whole world seemed to centre around you and your beloved.

Oh, there's power, power in love. Not just in its romantic forms, but any form, any shape of love. There's a certain sense in which when you are loved and you know it, when someone cares for you and you know it, when you love and you show it, it actually feels right. There's something right about it.

And there's a reason for it. The reason has to do with the source.

We were made by a power of love. And our lives were meant and are meant

to be lived in that love. That's why we are here.

Ultimately the source of love is God himself. The source of all of our lives. There's an old medieval poem that says where true love is found, God himself is there. The New Testament says it this way: Beloved, let us love one another, because love is of God and those who love are born of God and know God. Those who do not love, do not know God. Why? For God is love. There's power in love. There's power in love to help and heal when nothing else can. **There's power in love to lift up and liberate when nothing else will. There's power in love to show us the way to live.**

I'm talking about some power. Real power. Power to change the world.

Love is not selfish and self-centred. Love can be sacrificial, and in so doing, becomes redemptive.

And that way of unselfish, sacrificial, redemptive love changes lives and it can change this world.

If you don't believe me, just stop and think and imagine.

Well, think and imagine a world where love is the way. Imagine our homes and families when love is the way.

Imagine neighbourhoods and communities where love is the way.

Imagine governments and nations where love is the way.

Imagine business and commerce when love is the way.

Imagine this tired old world when love is the way.

When love is the way—unselfish, sacrificial, redemptive, when love is the way—then no child will go to bed hungry in this world ever again.

When love is the way, we will let justice roll down like a mighty stream and righteousness like an ever-flowing brook.

When love is the way, poverty will become history.

When love is the way, the earth will be a sanctuary.

When love is the way, we will lay down our swords and shields down by the riverside, to study war no more.

When love is the way, there's plenty good room, plenty good room for all of God's children.

Because when love is the way, we actually treat each other, well, like we are actually family.

When love is the way we know that God is the source of us all. And we are brothers and sisters. Children of God, my brothers and sisters, that's a new heaven. A new earth. A new world. A new human family.

Dr. King was right: We must discover love, the redemptive power of love. And when we do that, we will make of this old world a new world.

My brother, my sister, God love you, God bless you. And may God hold us all in those almighty hands of love.
