A Message From The Minister

Dear Friends,

“Christ has no hands but ours”. I know these are well meaning words, but really.... In the eighteenth century, a school of thought known as Deism held that God created the world and then left it to it's own devices, refusing to interfere any further. If we say, ‘Christ has no hands but ours’, we're being modern day Deists, giving up on God and relying on our own efforts. This doesn't get us very far and won't do. In fact, one very key reason for the decline of the Church in our part of the world is that we have jettisoned the supernatural, Spirit-led Christianity of the New Testament in favour of a managerial, human centred faith in which God is asked to bless whatever we decide to do.

I used the word ‘supernatural’ just then, and some of you will have frowned or looked puzzled. Surely talk of the supernatural belongs to the lunatic fringe of the Church? Well, I'm simply using the word to mean that which is beyond our everyday experience, that which comes from outside our everyday world of things and places that we can see. In the New Testament Church, people expected God to be tangibly and dramatically present in their midst. In growing churches, even today, there is an emphasis on encountering the living God in worship, a sense of being open to the Divine in our midst.

Too often, the contemporary Church has been obsessed with being relevant. If only we can show that we're relevant to people's actual lives, goes the mantra, our churches will grow. No. Our churches will grow if they help people to encounter God, in all His irresistible power and love, and be transformed by that encounter. The world doesn't need our relevance. The world needs us to be a gateway to God. Let's pray for that. Let's desire that above all else. Christ has hands – and arms. Let's pray for the world, as well as us, to be swept up in them.

Offerings & Income Tax

Over the past year or so the income of many churches has been severely reduced; however at Wonford our income has held up very well due to the amazing generosity of our fellowship.

One of the ways to increase our income is for us to claim **Gift Aid** (from HMRC – the tax people) on the donations we receive. We get an extra 25p for every £1 you give; it does not cost you anything and we make the claim.

If you pay income tax (and have registered with our Gift Aid Secretary – Paul Violet) we can claim Gift Aid on any money you give.

- Cheque or cash in one of our numbered envelopes.
- Direct giving by bank transfer or standing order.

If you DO NOT pay income tax the only way we can claim Gift Aid is for you to contribute by putting cash into the church offering – but it can't be £50 notes or cheques.

You can do this weekly, monthly or whenever you like and you do not need to include your name.

We cannot claim Gift Aid from contributions made directly into the church bank account by standing order or bank transfer.

I know this is more difficult these days when cash is used less and less but it would be of great financial benefit to our church. The Gift Aid we received last year was over £7,000.


G7 SUMMIT

June sees the UK hosting the 47th G7 Summit in Cornwall. Leaders from the G7 members of UK, Canada, USA, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, along with other invited leaders will meet at Carbis Bay near St Ives. The G7 Summit is an annual meeting where leaders come together in person to discuss world issues and this year will be important for leaders to focus on the international response and co-operation against the pandemic as well as the global climate crisis.

This year is also important as the newly elected Joe Biden will be attending (the 2020 US Summit was cancelled by President Trump) after initiating a return of the US to the Paris Agreement.

Together we must watch and pray that our leaders help the people of the world so that the poorest and most badly affected countries can recover and rebuild, and that the Summit is successful in setting out targets and initiatives for reducing greenhouse and promoting clean energy.

Members of The Mint Methodist Church Standing in Local Elections

Like Diana Moore, Mint Member, who successfully stood for the Green Party and now works tirelessly as Ward Councillor, two more members are now standing for election for the Greens on May 6th.

Andrew Bell is standing in the Devon County Elections. On the same ballot paper, Stuart Jackson is seeking to become Police & Crime Commissioner (PCC.)

Stuart writes:

Robert Peel set up the first UK police force 200 years ago. His championing of minority rights cost him many votes, but he followed his Christian conscience, rather than simply doing what would be popular.

In standing for PCC, in a small way, I’m trying to follow this great statesman. I’m seeking to make our Force more representative of all Council-Tax payers who fund it. At the moment only 31% of our Constables are women, and relatively few gain promotion, so only 21% of Sergeants are women. Based upon current local population, we should not only have more female officers but also 30% more officers than we currently do, from amongst groups of local people who experience racism.

My vision would be to uphold some of Peel’s founding principles for the original Metropolitan Police, based on collaboration with the public to achieve crime prevention.

Please do use your vote on May the Sixth. And May the Force be with us!

Heavitree Pleasure Ground Parklife Café

I don't know how many of our Wonford "Contact" readers wander round their local area; but this past year has taught me much about mine. For over 25 years of living here, it has fascinated me that my nearby Park is called a **Pleasure Ground**, somehow that is "old fashioned". But then, this area of Exeter was not part of the "city of Exeter" until early 1900s. On my daily "COVID-19" walks I have had much pleasure within it. So, it has certainly lived up to its title.

Within the large expanse, there are many big old trees of a great variety. I wish there was a recognised Tree Trail published, like the one around the nearby Higher Cemetery; which is another rather special place to visit, reflect and walk around. There is plenty of space for families in its rolling landscape and tennis courts, a bowling green and basketball court - besides the Won stream on the edge of its farthest side. Then this January, almost opposite Ben's Manse, the ground was being cleared and dug up! And, as the months have gone by, the Community Café is taking shape. I still don't know whether it will have PV Solar panels on its roof, like the one in Belmont Park. But this Café is tucked under some lovely big old trees; so, maybe it would not be able to generate much electricity. Currently, beside the building site, there's a big poster displaying children's artwork showing drawings of what they like about the park. I certainly live in a lovely part of Exeter.
